# Why CAGI Chapters Exist

Decisions made in the next few years will shape national accountability, resilience, and trust for a generation.

CAGI Chapters exist to:

- Anchor global AI and cybersecurity governance thinking at national level.
- Provide a neutral forum where government, industry, and academia can engage without commercial capture.
- Translate global foresight into practical, locally relevant governance action.
- Feed national insight back into a coordinated global governance model.

Chapters close the gap between technological power and institutional control.

# What a Chapter President Is

A Chapter President is the accountable national leader for CAGI, responsible for how the institute is perceived, trusted, and engaged with at country level.

The role exists to:

- Represent CAGI with recognised authority and professional credibility in discussions with government, regulators, industry leaders, and academia.
- Convene senior stakeholders across sectors who would not ordinarily collaborate, creating a neutral space for informed governance dialogue.
- Translate global CAGI governance frameworks, research, and foresight into nationally relevant discussion, programmes, and practical action.

This is a leadership and stewardship role.

It carries responsibility for substance, integrity, and impact, not promotion or representation alone.

## What You Are Building

A successful chapter is defined by:

- Trust across sectors.
- Substance over scale.
- Credibility with policymakers and institutions.
- Contribution to national and global governance thinking.

Headcount is secondary.  
Influence and trust are primary.

# Why be a Chapter President

For experienced leaders, this role represents a shift from operational impact to institutional influence. Being a CAGI Chapter President provides:

**National Influence:** Ability to shape national dialogue with regulators and institutions.

**Global Standing:** Formal leadership role within an international governance institute shaping future frameworks.


**Intellectual Leverage:** Early access to global research, foresight, and cross-jurisdictional insight.

**Professional Recognition:** Chapter leadership and approved CAGI activities contribute toward recognised Continuing Professional Education (CPE) requirements, subject to awarding body criteria.


# Core Responsibilities (High Level)

The Chapter President is accountable for:

- Strategic direction of the national chapter.
- Governance, ethics, and neutrality.
- Senior engagement with government, regulators, academia, and industry.
- Delivery of high-quality national programmes aligned to CAGI's three pillars.
- Representation of the chapter within the global CAGI network.

They are empowered to:

- Represent CAGI in senior national forums across government, industry, and academia.
- Establish and lead advisory and working groups aligned to CAGI's focus areas.
- Adapt global CAGI initiatives and programmes to local regulatory, cultural, and geopolitical context.

# Authority and Boundaries

Chapter Presidents are entrusted with meaningful authority to lead nationally, but that authority operates within clear governance limits.

They are empowered to:

- Represent CAGI in senior national forums across government, industry, and academia.
- Establish and lead advisory and working groups aligned to CAGI's focus areas.
- Adapt global CAGI initiatives and programmes to local regulatory, cultural, and geopolitical context.

The authority of a Chapter President comes from clear governance boundaries that protect independence, neutrality, and credibility.

- Chapters do not issue independent policy positions outside CAGI frameworks.
- Activities must preserve neutrality and avoid commercial or political capture.
- All programmes, messaging, and partnerships must align with CAGI governance principles.

# Governance and Oversight

CAGI Chapters operate as part of a single global institute, not as independent entities.

Each Chapter functions under:

- The CAGI Constitution and International Chapter Bylaws.
- Global Codes of Conduct, Conflict of Interest, and ethics policies.
- Defined reporting, review, and escalation mechanisms with CAGI Headquarters.

The Chapter President is accountable for ensuring:

- Ongoing alignment with CAGI's mission, governance principles, and positioning.
- Transparency in decision-making, partnerships, and programmes.
- Early escalation of risks that could affect credibility, neutrality, or trust.

**“Oversight is not a constraint on leadership, it is the mechanism that protects CAGI’s legitimacy and enables Chapters to operate with authority and confidence.”**


# Who This Role Is For

Chapter Presidents are typically:

- Senior practitioners, executives, or advisors with established credibility in cybersecurity, technology, policy, or governance.
- Comfortable operating at board, executive, and policy level, including engagement with regulators and public institutions.
- Independent in judgement, able to maintain neutrality under commercial or political pressure.
- Trusted across sectors, with the standing to convene government, industry, and academia in the same forum.
- Motivated by long-term institutional impact rather than short-term visibility or commercial gain.

CAGI Chapter Presidencies are intentionally limited to ensure depth, credibility, and long-term effectiveness. They are selected, not recruited.

For many, it is an opportunity to define the legacy of their leadership beyond any single organisation or role.
